and the sharing of resources.

Purpose

- Increase community awareness of the causes of homelessness, the needs of homeless people, and ways to end homelessness.

Grievance Procedure

Any individual who has a complaint with a shelter, homeless housing program, or housing first program, and is uncomfortable speaking with the administration of the program, may utilize the Coalition to End Homelessness Grievance Procedure.

Access Point 4 Housing

AP4H offers a point of entry for households experiencing homelessness or who will be homeless within 72 hours.

SCREENING

During your initial phone call, a Staff Member will determine your eligibility for services within Pierce County, and schedule you for an in-person meeting.

CONVERSATION

A Staff Member will have a conversation with you about your current living situation, and your options and your resources. Being scheduled for a conversation does not guarantee that housing services will be provided. Once you have been scheduled for a conversation, please bring the following documents:

Documents you MUST bring to the assessment:

3 months of income verification for all household members aged 18+ Documents you need to bring if available:

- Signed homeless certification (this can be a letter from someone who knows you are experiencing homelessness, a letter from a shelter, etc.)
- Sheriff's notice for eviction or foreclosure
- Termination of Tenancy

PLACEMENT ROSTER AND REFERRAL

During your conversation, you and the Staff Member will determine whether it will be appropriate to refer you to a housing provider. If so, your information will be added to the Community Placement Roster. When a housing resource becomes available, you will receive a follow up phone call from a Staff Member.

Please be sure to update AP4H on your current contact information and any changes in your situation that may affect your benefits, as this can impact programs for which you may qualify.

Associated Ministries is an interfaith organization housing Pierce County's Coordinated Entry. This program serves individuals and families experiencing homelessness (or who are at imminent risk of homelessness), including unaccompanied youth, young adults, and families, families transitioning from welfare to work, the elderly, individuals living with a disability, and people facing domestic violence. The agency's AP4H program offers access to services. When people are experiencing homelessness, they are screened for eligibility and referred to a Staff member for a conversation regarding their living situation, their options and resources. Referrals are made to housing programs (from shelter to permanent housing options) based on eligibility. These referrals are designed to connect clients with programs that best suit their needs.

Associated Ministries also houses other programs including Paint Tacoma-Pierce Beautiful, Annual Hunger Walk, Disaster Preparedness, Domestic Violence Chaplaincy, Payee and Homeless Mail Services, Pierce County Asset Building Coalition, Moments of Blessing, Family Permanency Project, Youth Advancement Housing, Congregational Based Affordable Housing, Foreclosure Housing Counseling, and more.
