This High School & Beyond Plan (HSBP) is a graduation requirement that helps all students get the most out of high school and think about their future. **Starting in 8th grade** you will complete a Career Interest Inventory and continue developing and revising this plan through the 12th grade. You will work with your school counselor, advisor and/or teachers to create your own individual plan, called a "personalized pathway", and will revise your plan annually to adjust for changing interests or postsecondary plans (what you plan to do the year following graduation from high school). Your post high school goals may include four-year colleges or universities, two-year community or technical colleges, apprenticeship programs, industry standard certificate programs, military training, or on-the-job training.

Required elements of your High School & Beyond Plan:

1. Identification of your **career goals** using a **career interest inventory**.
2. Identification of your **educational goals**.
3. A **four-year course plan** with an individualized **personalized pathway** that fulfills graduation requirements and aligns with your career and educational goals.
4. If you have not met standard on your state assessment, this plan *must* include **interventions and academic support, additional courses, or both** that will enable you to meet the high school graduation requirements.
5. By Spring Conferences of your senior year, **20 hours of community experience** and a current **resume**.
6. In the Spring of each year (beginning in the eighth grade), **a conference** that includes your updates to the High School and Beyond Plan. In the Spring of your senior year, you must complete a conference that includes the completed HSBP, resume, and documentation of 20 hours of community experience.

You will present your High School & Beyond Plan (HSBP) and the required elements by answering the following Essential Questions:

1. What are my career interests and educational goals?
2. What have I done in school to meet these goals?
3. What do my assessment results tell me about my strengths and about areas I need to grow?
4. How have my activity log (grades 8-11) or my resume (grade 12) AND my Community Experiences demonstrated connections with my community?
5. Senior Year Post-High School Question: What is your post-high school plan and what are your next steps?

The High School & Beyond Plan is used to guide your high school experience and prepare you for postsecondary education or training and career. This plan is updated each year to reflect your assessment results, review of your high school transcript, and assess progress toward identified goals. Your plan can be revised as necessary for changing interests, goals, and needs.

A. ACTIVITY LOG AND RESUME

Your High School & Beyond Plan **must include a completed resume by the end of 12th Grade.** An activity log is a good way to track your progress and begin your resume preparation. You will usually need one if you are applying for a job, an internship, or scholarship, and one may be needed for a college application. A resume or activity log summarizes who you are and should include your education, work, and extracurricular experiences and skills.

Objective

If you are applying for a job, describe why you want the job, and what you hope to learn. If you are not applying for a job right now, write that you want to put your skills to work in the community. If you are using your activity log for writing a personal statement for a college or scholarship application, more details about your leadership roles, goals, or special circumstances are needed.

Education

Begin with your most recent education and work backwards. You may include your expected graduation year.

Work Experiences

Work experience does not have to be paid. You can also include unpaid work, such as internships. Include the company or individual's name, your title, descriptions of your duties and dates of employment.

Volunteer Experience

You may include any volunteer work you have completed recently. Include your position title, organization, city, dates of involvement, and a brief description of the project or experience.

Awards and Certificates

Highlight your awards or certificates by including the name of the award, what the award is for, who it was awarded by (e.g. school, community organization, etc.), and additional pertinent information.

Extracurricular Activities

Highlight activities that you participate in. For each activity record how you are involved and what skills you have gained from it. For example, if you are an avid collector, you may have great organizational skills.

Skills and Abilities

You may include computer skills, personal talents, and other attributes that may set you apart from other applicants.

References

References are people that potential employers can contact to learn more about you and verify information on your resume. References are usually current or former employers, teachers, or people who have overseen extracurricular activities (e.g. coaches, supervisors, etc.). Typically, you should have two or three references. Be sure to ask people before you list them as references.
